Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program Request for Application (Cal OES)

Recommendation: That the Lassen County Board of Supervisors authorize the Board Chairman to execute the original Resolution of the Board of Supervisors Of Lassen County Approving The Undertaking Of The Lassen County District Attorney's Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program to be funded through the State of California administered by the California Office of Emergency Services and authorize the Lassen County District Attorney and the Lassen County Administrative Officer to execute any and all documents necessary in order to obtain grant funding for the Child Advocacy Center Program/Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team for 2018/2019.

Summary: The Lassen County District Attorney's Office established a Multi-Disciplinary Team in the early 1990's in conjunction with various county and community based organizations to provide collaborative efforts in the investigation and prosecution of child sexual and physical abuse. On December 14, 2017, the California Office of Emergency Services announced Federal pass through dollars in the amount of over \$11,000,000 to the counties of California in support of their Child Advocacy Centers and Multi-Disciplinary Teams to develop collaborative efforts necessary to support victims of crime and reduce trauma.

The District Attorney's Office, in partnership with collaborative partners, will establish a facility whose purpose is to provide child victims a safe, non-threatening place to tell what happened to them during necessary investigations of child abuse. The Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team staff offer forensic interviewing, crisis intervention and ongoing supportive services to help child victims and non-offending family members begin the healing process and participate in the prosecution of the crime. Children and families in Lassen County will benefit greatly by having access to child-focused services.

They will receive:

- More immediate follow-up to child abuse reports.
- Efficient medical and mental health services and referrals.
- A reduction in the number of child victim interviews to reduce trauma.

- Increased successful prosecution.
- Consistent ongoing support for child victims and the non-offending adults in their lives.
- Child Protective Services, Law Enforcement, the District Attorney's Office, Mental Health Professionals, Advocates, Medical Professionals and the MDIT Coordinator work as a team to deliver quality, comprehensive services to abused children.
- Child abuse victims experience a process of investigation, intervention, prosecution and stabilization that is more efficient and effective.
- Non-offending family members or caregivers of the abused children are also provided ongoing services needed to attain stabilization and healing for each child and family.

Fiscal Impact: It is the District Attorney's philosophy to attempt to isolate grant funding to salaries and benefits and the least amount to operational expenses other than the operating expenses necessary to support the program, including funds set aside for mandatory and continuing education training. Our first year grant application also allows for the extensive equipment necessary to perform the functions of audio/visual taping and recording of child interviews and the conference room equipment needed for the team to view/participate in the interviews. The grant budget includes the maximum amount allowable under the grant for the amounts charged to the program for office space, Workers Compensation Insurance, Unfunded Pers Liability and Liability Insurance. We have set aside a small amount for the costs of office supplies and postage. The cost of the District Attorney's Child Advocacy Center Program (MDIT Program) will be reimbursed to Lassen County through the grant administered by the California Office of Emergency Services, Criminal Justice, and Emergency Management & Public Safety Grant Programs Division. The Child Advocacy Center (KC) allocation to Lassen County for fiscal/grant year April 2018 through March 2019 is \$218,750: \$175,000 in VOCA and \$43,750 in VOCA Match Requirement for which we anticipate needing to submit a waiver. The Lassen County District Attorney's Office will manage the Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team Coordinator as 100% 1 FTE, 10% of the cost associated with the legal prosecution and advocacy of a Deputy District Attorney and 5% of the fiscal administration will be the responsibility of the DA Program Coordinator.

Other Agency Involvement: The Lassen County District Attorney's Office, in partnership with the community we serve, is dedicated to ensuring public safety through the vigorous, ethical and professional prosecution of crime while protecting the rights of victims and witnesses. With the move to the new Government Center Building, the Lassen County District Attorney's Office now has the office space available to house a community-based MDIT that responds to child abuse while minimizing trauma and providing advocacy to the child victim and their family. Our team consists of professionals from several agencies, including:

- ➤ Lassen County Sheriff's Department
- ➤ Lassen County Victim/Witness
- ➤ Susanville Police Department
- ➤ Lassen Family Services, DV, SARC and CHAT Programs

- > Lassen County Child and Family Services
- > Partnerships with Lassen County Behavioral Health and Banner Lassen Medical Center will be developed during the grant period.

Dear Program Manager;

The Lassen County District Attorney is requesting a waiver for the match per the information below:

- Applicant: County of Lassen, Office of the District Attorney
- Subgrant Number: KC17010180
- Project Period: 04/01/2018 to 03/31/2019
- Proposed Award Amount: \$218,750
- Match Required (before waiver): \$43,750
- Amount the Applicant Can Match: \$17,553
- Amount the Applicant Request to be Waived: \$26,197
- Percentage of Waiver Request: 40%

Justification: The Lassen County District Attorney's Office and the new Child Advocacy Center/MDIT Program will be challenged to find qualified interns and volunteers for unpaid work because of the small percentage of individuals enrolled in the local community college. The nearest university is 85 miles away. Additionally, because of the county's rural, large square mileage spread, only a small pool of volunteers are able to commit to their current hours causing fewer opportunities for in-kind match.

Example: During 2017 one DA volunteer provided 203 hours of service (@ rate of about 4 hours per week for 52 weeks) = \$3,135, in addition to the equivalent benefits of \$1,597 for a total worth of in-kind match of only \$4,732. In hiring the new MDIT Program Coordinator, it is the hope of the department to assign volunteer recruitment to the new staff and develop a stronger volunteer and legal intern pool.

Project Narrative

Problem Statement / Introduction: The Lassen County District Attorney's Office endeavors to develop a child-friendly facility whose purpose is to provide child victims a safe, non-threatening place to tell what happened to them during the necessary investigations of child sexual and physical abuse. These most vulnerable victims of crime suffer tremendous loss, not only physically and psychologically, but loss of their very childhood. Families and non-offending caregivers often struggle navigating the complex criminal justice system. Developing, educating and supporting the current Multi-Disciplinary Team will allow the county to more effectively provide service to child victims and their families.

Currently, interviews of child victims take place at the police department in a suspect interview room. The victim's family and advocacy staff must wait in the public lobby, which is neither heated nor cooled. Because of public access, advocates cannot discuss services or offer meaningful, confidential support during the interview process. A safe, comfortable, victim centered space is desperately needed for child victims in our community. Within our current application to Cal OES, we are requesting to incorporate funding to establish a complete MDI audio/visual room and conference center with which a child centered focus provides the environment necessary for safe child and family disclosure and support. Private foundation and alternative funding for the necessary audio/visual and recording equipment are limited and difficult to obtain. Our goals for the future of the Child Advocacy Center and current Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team (MDIT) include:

- ► Remaining focused on the needs of the child victim of sexual and physical abuse;
- ► Supporting the development the MDIT to the next level of progress necessary toward National Accreditation;
- ▶ Developing effective protocol in information sharing while ensuring the dignity and confidentiality of the victim;
- ▶ Providing training and education to the members of the Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team;
- ▶ Effectively track statistics and demographics while streamlining MDI's within the county;
- ► Monitor the progress of a case until the end of prosecution;
- ► Follow-up through confidential participant surveys for quality control;
- ► Establish, through a Memorandum of Understanding, delineating the roles and responsibilities of each partner while respecting individual agency and departmental mandates.

The Lassen County District Attorney's Office, in partnership with the community we serve, is dedicated to ensuring public safety through the vigorous, ethical and professional prosecution of crime while protecting the rights of victims and witnesses. The project will develop along the criteria established by the National Standards for Accreditation and will coordinate interventions to reduce potential trauma to children while improving service delivery. Our plan for the future includes an Child Advocacy Center within five years, either as an independent 501 ©(3) non-profit or as a sub department within the District Attorney's

Department structured similarly to the Child Advocacy Center in Washoe County, Nevada.

Lassen County is a rural community encompassing over 4,720 square miles. According to the 2016 census, the area contains a population of 30,870. The city of Susanville, the county seat, (often described as "Prison Town USA") has a population of 17,974 which includes the general population as well individuals incarcerated within the local jail. As of November 1, 2017, the California Department of Corrections and Federal Bureau of Prisons state approximately 8,875 or 25 percent of the Lassen County population are incarcerated. Inmates are housed within two California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation high and moderate security facilities, in addition to one medium to low-level federal penitentiary. Although the population of the county continues to shrink because of Prop 47 inmate release and individual relocation, the District Attorney's Office continues to see the number of victims served increase.

Government, whether local, state or federal, are the primary sources of local employment, after agriculture. Additionally, because of the close proximity to Reno, Nevada, the largest city 80 miles from the seat of the county, Lassen County has become a thoroughfare to interstate 5 and Northern California resulting in a higher number of gang related crimes, human trafficking, drug distribution and cultivation. However, the county is rural, and in some areas, Pioneer; Lassen County is far from the ideal of rolling farmland of milk and honey. Isolated, especially during the harsh winter, travel is often treacherous or even impossible. Crime continues rampant, and disparate to the larger cities, differentiated by large concentrations of land verses isolated

pockets of crime located throughout urban areas of the state. Land spread provides an ideal environment for the secrecy associated with child sexual and physical abuse crimes, a challenge for local law enforcement. There are less avenues for detection and rural isolation offers an environment for abuse to flourish. Travel to the service area in Susanville can be difficult, if not impossible in winter from the outlying areas of the county. However, during good weather, clients in the far-reaching areas travel up to two hours, one way, to the city center, to receive services.

History: The Lassen County District Attorney's Multi-Disciplinary Investigative Team

Program (MDIT) was first established and early in the 1990's. Senior Investigators of the

District Attorney's Office began collaboration with local law enforcement and social service
agencies to address the growing need for investigative services specific to child victims. The
work accomplished by the early pioneers of MDIT began with limited resources, but grew to
support the critical need of assisting victims on a part-time basis, in addition to other
investigative duties required of their positions. Because of the increased case count and the
complexity of the child sexual abuse cases currently encountered by the team, the MDIT

Program can now support a full-time Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator staff to plan, develop
and support collaborative efforts in continuing education and professional forensic interview
techniques as, unfortunately, the demand for services can be demonstrated.

The dedicated MDIT staff will be responsible for case management from the initial disclosure to the prosecution of the crime, data management, statistical reporting and final

surveying of victims served and those collaborative members involved in the MDIT process to evaluate program success.

Volunteers: The Multi-Disciplinary Investigative Team program utilizes volunteers primarily in office work and in conjunction with yearly special events. One DA specifically assigned volunteer helps with logging-in victim related case information, organizing and filing case files, correspondence, and community outreach. Additionally, the volunteer supports the department during events such as the Law Enforcement Appreciation Day and the Annual Open House. During the 2017 calendar year, the DA volunteer provided 203 hours of active service. The time invested by the volunteer at 203 hours at a rate of \$15.30 is \$3,106.00 worth of in-kind match. The Multi-Disciplinary Investigative Team has limited human capital by way of interns and volunteers, the lack of which results in challenges to maintaining a broad volunteer pool. Individuals qualified, or willing to give their time, to this difficult and trauma-filled field, remain few. Volunteers assigned to MDIT projects will also benefit from training and support in vicarious trauma and self-care provided by the CIR team and various on-line web based curriculum for a minimum of 8 hours continuing education credits per calendar year.

Demographics: Interestingly, Lassen County demographics reflect primarily Caucasian but the area sees a significant fluctuation in the Hispanic and Pacific Islander populations during the year. Migrant farm workers are employed by local agriculture during strawberry season.

Palau representatives come to the area on sports scholarships to attend the local community college. In the past we rarely saw crime within these communities, unfortunately, in the last year,

there have been multiple assaults and other crimes committed against these groups. Lassen

County also boasts a thriving Native American population comprised of Paiute and Maidu tribes within the local Rancheria. Moreover, inmate's families relocate to the area to be near their loved ones resulting in a large transient population bringing its own unique challenges to the community. Poverty, substance abuse and a lack of affordable housing is characteristic not only to inmate families, but to our rural victims and families as a whole. Lassen County MDIT has been fortunate in that it has not had to confront the challenge of locating interpreters for victims, often, but when called upon to provide services to non-English speaking clients, qualified translators are scarce and the program has had to utilize private contractors, Google Translator, TTY and the court.

Plan / Services: The primary service provided to child sexual assault and physical abuse victims are: A safe, neutral, child centered environment in which to conduct forensic interviews to reduce the need for multiple interviews to reduce the likelihood of re-traumatizing the victim. Members of the MDIT collaboration will watch initial interviews and provide feedback for victim centered needs and services. The audio and video recordings will then be used as evidence in the prosecution of these crimes by Deputy District Attorney's. The in-house Victim Witness program and Community Based Organizations will provide resource and referrals for families and non-offending caregivers. Together we will follow through with case management; ensuring effective services are being provided by the partnership to align with the needs of the child and family.

Statistics: The following demonstrates the most recent Lassen County Victim/Witness services provided to victims: Of the 232 total clients served during the 2015-2016 fiscal year, the majority of victims reside in the city of Susanville, and 132 of those clients were new. Victim Witness states the program provided advocacy to victims of:

- Child Sexual Abuse 25 victims served
- Child Physical Abuse 25 victims served

In 2016-2017, 60% of all MDIT clients were comprised of five crime types reported earlier to Cal OES. Of the 15 cases referred to the MDI Team in the calendar year of 2017 the victims consisted of children: Ages- 0-5: 3; 6-12: 8; 13-18: 4. 10 victims were female, 5 male; 13 Caucasian, 1 African American, 1 Hispanic.

Addressing Need: MDIT addresses the needs of victims throughout the entire Criminal Justice system, providing comprehensive services to special needs child victims in our jurisdiction is a priority; the physically and mentally challenged, sight and/or hearing impaired and other vulnerable populations are seeing a heightened need for advocacy. It has been considered, once the MDIT Memorandum is established satisfactorily, the team branch off to incorporate other types of victims, such as the elderly. At this time, however, in the early establishment of the program the service focus will remain with child sexual and physical abuse.

Currently, the only Pediatric Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) available to us is located in Sparks, Nevada, an hour and a half drive away, in good weather. A SANE will provide young children the necessary sexual assault exams for medical treatment and the collection of

evidence for effective prosecution. The team will prioritize the necessary addition of medical professionals within the MDI Team to address the medical needs of the children served.

Additionally, the team will work toward collaborating with the county Behavioral Health Department to include staff to participate in the MDIT process to address child and family wellness.

Referrals: Referrals to the program are made in numerous ways; internally within the District Attorney's Office, after the review of crime reports from law enforcement or requests for interviews are made by law enforcement to our Chief Investigator (and acting part-time MDIT Coordinator). An increasing number of victims come to the program though law enforcement referrals prior to the matter being formally referred to the District Attorney's Office, others are referred to the program through our participation in the Crisis Intervention and Response Team or from the local domestic violence and sexual assault center. After initial contact is made by law enforcement, members of the MDIT contact the victim(s) caregiver to explain the MDIT process, and answer questions. No viable request or need is rejected. Additional support and follow up are provided through Victim/Witness and case management with the assigned Deputy District Attorney.

Collaboration: Through participation in the Multi-Disciplinary Investigative Team, (which includes members of law enforcement, child protective services, community based non-profits, deputy district attorneys and others) the MDIT offers a critical component of support to families struggling when a child family member discloses sexual or physical abuse. Moreover,

MDIT collaborates with a variety of agencies that share our goals within the criminal justice and dependency system; together community service organizations and social service agencies endeavor to meet the needs of victims. Within the last four years members of the MDIT have participated in the Crisis Intervention Response Team (CIRT) – a joint venture between hospital, social services, law enforcement and other victim service agencies to provide open dialog to increase victim service effectiveness and maximize best practice.

Our current MDIT Program is developing Operational Agreements with the following agencies and organizations within Lassen County. Training specific to the development and implementation of a Memorandum of Understanding are discussed further within the budget narrative as training and mediation from CIR is necessary in order to achieve our shared goals:

- ➤ Lassen County Sheriff's Department
- > Susanville Police Department
- ➤ Lassen Family Services, DV, SARC and CHAT Programs
- ➤ Lassen County Child and Family Services
- > We are in the stages of identifying partners from Banner Lassen Medical Center and Lassen County Behavioral Health

Outreach: Lassen County has a number of One-Stop offices in the outlying areas of the County (i.e. Westwood, Bieber, Doyle, and Herlong) which provide services to victims in mental health treatment and drug and alcohol services. The new MDIT staff will work collaboratively with current One-Stop staff and Victim/Witness to meet community needs in outlying areas to

distribute educational materials in multiple languages regarding recognizing the signs of child abuse and sexual assault, the importance of reporting and how to receive support services.

Finally, the program will develop outreach and education projects and participate in community events, facilitate educational opportunities with community organizations, the public and law enforcement.

The Lassen County Multi-Disciplinary Interview Team does not discriminate against any individual regardless of sex, gender, age, sexual orientation, religious or political affiliation. The MDIT program is committed to providing the greatest number of comprehensive services, both mandatory and optional, to every victim served. We strive to provide trauma informed care and individualized assistance with compassion. Funding from Cal OES in the Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program grant offers the opportunity for our rural community to provide 21st century care to child victims – a first step in a long, enduring process toward a Child Advocacy Center. Budget Narrative

We have prepared our 2018/2019 grant budget to accomplish the following goals and support the Budget as submitted:

- ► Support the Program's objectives and activities;
- ▶ In a manner to minimize administrative costs and support direct services;
- ► To support the duties of project staff

Personal Services

Total allocated for Personal Services: \$90,502

The program budget is calculated to cover the salary and benefits of one full-time staff member as 1FTE as well as calculated for the county required PERS Unfunded Retirement Liability and Worker Compensation Insurance attributable to the Lassen County Child Advocacy Center Program:

Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator – Hire to be determined: The Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator will be a 100% full-time equivalent position within our program. As of the date of submission the MDIT Coordinator job description for the, as submitted, equates to that of the current Victim Witness Program Coordinator as an additional position and job description have yet to be approved the Lassen County Administration. Modification of the job description will take place before the end of the grant period. Once a new or updated job description is approved, it will be submitted to Cal OES. Currently, the Victim/Witness Program Coordinator job description is included and delineates much the same qualifications for and duties of the position. The Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator is compensated at the Lassen County UPEC Range of 18 Step A for three months with a salary increase to Step B for the final nine months of the grant period. The base salary for this position is \$42,618 per year or approximately \$3430 a month for the first 3

months with an increase to \$3,592 a month for the final 9 months of the grant year of April 1, 2018 through March 31, 2017. The Coordinator will receive the following estimated benefits from

The Multi-Disciplinary Team Coordinator will be responsible for the day-to-day administration of the MDIT Program grant project and will be supervised by the DA Program Coordinator. This position will not supervise other staff but will provide coordination of services from the Lassen County MDIT partnerships in providing victim advocacy and support. Administrative duties will include, but not be limited to, the responsibility for project reporting, grant compliance, overseeing the delivery of services, coordination of community outreach projects, scheduling MDIT forensic interviews, quarterly meetings and taking minutes, statistical and data management and reporting, organizing training for the MDI Team and partners. This position will also be responsible for other duties as assigned. Total salary and benefits for the MDIT Coordinator will be: \$61,193.

District Attorney Program Coordinator/Fiscal Administration

The District Attorney Program Coordinator/Fiscal Administrator will be a 10% full-time equivalent position within the program (4 hours per week). The District Attorney Program Coordinator/Fiscal Administrator is compensated at the Lassen County Mid-Management Range of 22, Step E for 12 months. The base salary for this position is \$56,796 and therefore the total salary for the coordinator will be \$5680. The position receives the following benefits from Lassen County:

The job description for the described position of District Attorney Program Coordinator/Fiscal Administration is included with the Project Narrative and describes the qualifications for and duties of the position.

The District Attorney Program Coordinator/Fiscal Administrator will be responsible for the fiscal responsibly of the Child Advocacy Center (KC) Program/MDIT grant project and direct

supervision of the MDIT Coordinator. Duties will include, but not be limited to, the training and support of the MDIT Coordinator, receiving/depositing 2-201 funds; preparing invoices for travel, postage and 2-201's, program necessary accounts payable and receivable, assisting in grant quarterly reporting, bank account reconciliation, monitor the grant and county budget and other administrative duties as they arise. The salary and benefits for the position will be paid 100% from VOCA funds.

District Attorney Deputy - Felony Child Sexual Abuse/Physical Abuse Prosecutor

The District Attorney Deputy will be a 10% full-time equivalent position within the program, though this percentage is a fraction of the total necessary time to provide legal input during MDI, one-on-one legal advocacy to child victims and legal information to non-offending caregivers. The District Attorney Deputy is compensated at the Lassen County Mid-Management Range of 28, Step E for 12 months. The base salary for this position is \$75,312 and therefore the total salary for the Deputy will be \$7,531. The position receives the following benefits from Lassen County:

The job description for the described position of Deputy District Attorney is included with the Project Narrative and describes the qualifications for and duties of the position. The percentage salary and benefits for the position will be paid 100% from VOCA funds.

Operating Expenses

Total Allocated for Operating Expenses: \$54,446

In an effort to dedicate a smaller percentage of grant cost to operating expenses, the program will focus only on those amounts necessary to support the project. The largest percentage of total grant funds will be dedicated to Personal costs and Equipment needs. Operating expenses include:

<u>Liability Insurance</u> — The liability insurance costs attributed to the program by Lassen County will be \$750. The cost will be covered by utilizing 100% of VOCA funds.

Informational Technology (IT) Direct Billing – The IT direct billing for 1FTE MDIT Coordinator is to cover the cost of internet services, email access, Office 365, anti-virus and system storage and backup maintained through the county IT department. Each county staff member is charged the same cost for all services, which is \$2,061, regardless of the FTE assignation. The cost will be covered by 100% VOCA funds. IT does not charge for volunteer access and the Fiscal Administrator's cost will be covered by the District Attorney budget.

<u>Communication</u> - \$480 is allocated for the use of the county phone system. The amount will cover the cost of the public phone and necessary call charges and will be billed at 100% VOCA.

<u>Recruitment</u> - \$115 is allocated for the purpose of publishing the recruitment notice for the MDIT Coordinator in the local paper for 3 weeks and will be Matched by DA budget funds.

<u>Postage</u> – Postage costs are estimated for the use of the leased postage meter and all costs associated with mailings necessary to the program at a cost of \$336.

Office Supplies – The allocation of \$ 500 for office supplies will be 100% VOCA funded and include items such as copier paper, case file folders and other supplies necessary for program support.

<u>Indirect Costs (A-87)</u> – Indirect costs attributed to the program by the county will be \$ 6000. The indirect cost rate will be 10% de Minimis of the project and covered 100% by VOCA.

Facility Rental – In April of 2017 the District Attorney and Victim Witness relocated to 2950 Riverside Drive, Suite 102, in Susanville. The new space has one office to be assigned to the MDIT Coordinator as a workspace and as the forensic interview room. Additionally, there is file room, lobby, copy room, conference room and storage space for use by the Coordinator. Moreover, a secure Evidence Room is available for the storage of the confidential MDIT child forensic interviews and access to this space is limited to only three staff. The total square footage is 516 at a cost of \$1.75 per square foot per month of \$903 or \$10,836 yearly.

Memberships – The grant required membership to CACC for a rural county is \$300 and an auxiliary membership for access to the California District Attorney's website and resources is \$85. Background check – The cost to vet the MDIT Coordinator are estimated at \$150. This cost will include the county mandated check as well as costs associated with fingerprinting, as necessary for access to the CLETS system and reports.

Community Outreach Brochures: The cost to create and produce educational materials regarding the MDIT Program and in recognizing Child Sexual/Physical Abuse reporting and support will cost \$400 for printing in English and Spanish translation.

<u>Training (Travel and Mileage)</u> – Training of MDIT partners is a major component of our grant request and the first project has allocated \$14,533 in training funds to be used for various county and MDIT partners participating in the process. Jensen Hall is reserved at \$800, with \$200 in

Match to provide the venue. (See separate CIR Training Invoice attached.) The two-day training is a highly necessary expense in order to coordinate the mission of the county and MDIT participants to reach long-term strategic goals. Additionally, cost for registration, mileage, accommodations and per diem for the Regional Training, Entry Level Child Forensic Interviewing (for the MDIT Coordinator and interested law enforcement and caseworkers) and various other training, to be announced at a later date, are included in the Budget at \$4,628 and necessary to the mission toward a cohesive team.

Two Day Training: The Center for Innovation and Resources, Inc. (CIR) contracts with a finite group of uniquely qualified professionals available to train both the Multi-Disciplinary Response to Child Sexual Abuse (MDT) and Child Forensic Interview Trainings (CFIT). As a significant portion of their annual objectives, both the Northern and Southern CATTA Centers (implemented by CIR) coordinate one MDT and two CFIT trainings each fiscal year. Each of these trainings requires two primary trainers who have experience in forensic interviewing of children. Every attempt is made to include one trainer serving in a law enforcement position, who also regularly conducts forensic interviews as part of their duties, in order to increase law enforcement buy-in in the multidisciplinary model. In addition, CIR seeks trainers with the skills and experience necessary to facilitate an effective, interactive, and professional training for all who attend. CIR will utilize subject matter experts to provide a customized, multi-day training on multidisciplinary team development. The months prior to the training will be spent meeting to gather specific needs and discussing an appropriate training plan. Following the training, CIR and it's experts will provide follow up coaching to increase sustainability of practices learned and providing support when issues arise.

CIR has been providing multidisciplinary team building and forensic interview training for

professionals for over 15 years. CIR staff has over 45 years of combined staff experience of working with a network of experts to deliver high quality training and coaching. CIR's Child Abuse Training and Technical Assistance grant presents CFIT training curriculum that aligns with NCA guidelines. CIR utilizes a pool of subject matter experts to develop and implement training on topics related to MDT development.

The experts CIR contracts with to provide these trainings are a group of the few professionals in the State who are qualified to train the MDT and CFITs. Due to the recurring nature of these trainings, utilization of trainers on a persistent basis adds to the quality of the event; presenters become increasingly comfortable with the curriculum and refine their teaching strategies based on experience. Additionally, the costs expended for trainer preparation time for each event is significantly decreased by utilizing this highly professional group that is familiar with the materials. The time, staff resources, and effort that would be expended by posting a contract for bid for each MDT/CFIT training throughout the fiscal year would be redundant and inefficient. (The Curriculum Vitae of the CIR consultants follow.)

Equipment Expenses

As mentioned within the Project Narrative, the current space being used for forensic interviewing, though appreciated by the team and donated by the Susanville Police Department, is not particularly suited to the needs of the MDIT. Currently, interviews of child victims take place at the police department in a suspect interview room. The victim's family and our staff must wait in the public lobby. Because of public access, advocates cannot discuss services or offer meaningful, confidential support during the interview process. Again, a safe, comfortable, victim centered space is desperately needed for child victims in our community. Within the new space housing the District Attorney's offices, a conference and interview room (and hall lobby

waiting area) are available for upgrade to suit the team and victim's needs. Separate entries allow victims to access service without fear of running into offenders. Additionally, Victim Witness has graciously offered their child and family friendly waiting area to provide victim and non-offending caregiver advocacy. Until the dream of an independent Child Advocacy Center is realized, creating a child focused and professional space for forensic interviewing and advocacy within the District Attorney's Office is ideal. The costs of creating the necessary environment are delineated further within the Lassen County IT Department quote attached and addresses Cal OES request to complete the form Cal OES 2-157 (Revised 7/2015) Computers and Automated Systems Purchase Justification Guidelines.

The equipment request in the current grant is vital to the success of the Lassen County

District Multi-Disciplinary Investigative Team Program. Without the equipment requested, the program will be unable to fulfill the most basic role of child advocacy. Child Safety. Continuing to attempt to provide service to victims and their families at a law enforcement station increases the likelihood of interaction with offenders, breaks confidentiality and fosters less than effective interviews – negating the very mission of a Child Advocacy Center to reduce trauma to young victims and the effective prosecution of these cases. The need for adequate, professional and expertly installed equipment is imperative to a successful program, hence the necessary cost of \$47,585.
